New Year's Surprises

"Oh no! It's January and I have promised to go back to the gymnasium." What was I thinking when I made that promise to myself for the New Year? Will I actually become one of those "Jan gymmers," the bane of regular gym patrons that stack up between the cardio machines for the whole month of January and the first week of February? I have loathed them from the free-weight section and now I am one. It is so easy to get out of the habit, to fall out of love with exercise, and to neglect a body busy with other things. If breaking any of the bad habits in my life were half that easy, life would be simpler. So, I'm committed: it is back to stair steppers and treadmills, back to machines and free-weights, back to yoga for me in January. I feel like a part of the culture, and I trust that the rest of you will resist the urge to scoff too loudly when you see me sore, yet resolute in the first weeks of the new year.

New years come – even to Christ Church. Wouldn't it be interesting to look back over the long history of this place and to see all the New Year's sermons that have been preached here? This will be the 247th New Year that we celebrate as a family of faith (give or take a few years of closed doors due to "local disturbance"). Imagine the issues and emergencies, the trends and directions that have punctuated the life of God's people here during all that time. I wonder if time really moves that differently now on Capitol Street than it did all those years ago. Surely, our access to information allows and insists that we live with a more global perspective, as we absorb news from around the world in mere seconds after an event. But I wonder if we really are that different at all from parishioners here two hundred years ago and more.

Some things I know have not changed. Just as they did, we worry about an uncertain future. Just as they, we count on those closest to us in times of trouble. Just as they, we express a great hope in our children. Just as they, we do not agree about everything in our lives. Just as they, we live in faith that, in the midst of

things we do not understand, God holds us in loving hands.

I wonder if they made New Year's resolutions. I wonder if they kept them any better than we do. What sorts of resolve would be fitting for us as a faith family for the next year? Perhaps:

- To strengthen our efforts to hear every voice at the table.
- To proclaim our love for God in the daily actions we have with each other.
- To give thankfully of what God gives us to make a difference in the world.

Or maybe the historic resolves of the baptismal covenant:

- To continue in the apostles' teaching.
- To persevere in resisting evil. To repent and return to God.
- To proclaim the Good News by word and example.
- To seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourself.
- To strive for justice and peace among all persons, respecting the dignity of every human being.

These seem a big assignment, but then God gives us a big job: to be God's people in the world – to bear the work of Christ in our own generation – to make this year a year of God's favor to all people.

Compared to all that, maybe getting back to the gym isn't such an awesome task. Maybe God is calling you and me to even greater things in this New Year. May God grant us all the blessings of love and belonging, and the challenge of answering the call to new life.

Thanks for the Christmas Fair!

What a lovely day we had – perfect weather, a steady stream of folks, and a wonderful atmosphere within the beautiful Parish Hall! We understand that several of the crafts vendors said the Christ Church Fair is the nicest one they attend.

So how much did we take in? After expenses, about \$9,600! Of that money, about \$850 goes to the Christ Church Mission Fund, and \$255 to the Youth Choir for their Heifer International Ark project. The rest of the income from the Fair, about \$8,400, will go to the Allocations Committee for local outreach.

The \$255 for the Youth Choir left them just \$45 short of their \$5,000 goal to purchase the Ark. But thanks to contributions to the Heifer project after the Fair, the Youth Choir reached its goal and can now purchase the Ark! Congratulations to the Youth Choir for your persistence and commitment to this project over the five years you were fund raising!

There were several unusually generous financial contributions in support of the Fair. In addition, members of the Fair Committee and many others contributed several hundred dollars in un-reimbursed expenses. Thank you, thank you, thank you all.

Report on the 2007 Diocesan Convention

This year we convened in Fitchburg, at the far frontier of the Diocese. Your lay delegates were Cal Magruder, Joyce Walker, and Charley Musselman. Joe Robinson, Jeff Mello, and Karen Montagno were our clergy attending. Convention has five elements: progress reports, legislative business, the Bishop's vision for the future, worship, and fellowship. For a full account of the official business of the convention, see Tracy Sukraw's report on Diomass.org. Here we will share some impressions.

"Holy Partners in a Heavenly Calling," Hebrews 3:1, was the theme of Bishop Tom Shaw's meditations. He developed the ideas of Vitality and Viability, introduced in the special convention last Spring. A vital congregation is one with activity and enthusiasm, full of the Holy Spirit. A viable parish has the resources necessary to function, a serviceable building, adequate money, perhaps an endowment. Most lucky parishes like Christ Church are vital and viable, but a parish struggling to survive may be neither.

Tom told of meeting with the vestry of St. Luke's in Malden. Because of population shifts, this parish has been shrinking for years. Indeed, nearly everyone in the congregation is on the vestry! Tom suggested that in view of their declining numbers, perhaps they might consider joining with another church. Anxious, they asked what would become of the building, the equipment, the money of the parish? "It's all Mine!" said the monk, trying to sound greedy. A few weeks later, he learned that they were visiting neighboring parishes as a group, having vowed to stay together.

In addition to consolidation, it may prove appropriate to establish mechanisms for resource sharing, so that the wealthier parishes could lend support to struggling, but vital ones. But it seems that the time is not yet ripe for the realization of this vision and the resolution that would have moved Convention closer to a "Holy Partnership" was sent back for additional work. Resolutions denouncing gambling, celebrating diversity, and correcting language were passed.

We analyzed and passed a budget for 2008. Of the total \$7.7M, Christ Church contributes \$104,000 or about 1.4%. Our Diocese passes \$1.2M or about 16% upward to the Episcopal Church in America. Budget details are on the Diomass.org site.

We heard generally favorable reports from the several mission committees. Most important, we heard from the Rev. Jane Bearden, our woman on the ground on the Gulf Coast. Her message was, in short, things are bad and getting better. Bishop Gayle Harris told us of conditions on the occupied West Bank. There, things are very bad and getting worse. An offering during the convention Eucharist raised \$5K for St. Luke's Anglican Hospital in Nablus, Palestine.

During the Dinner to benefit the Gulf Coast Partnerships Ministry, we auctioned several items from Boston's championship sports teams. (Bishop Tom extended sympathy to the Bishops of Ohio and Colorado, both former priests in Massachusetts, on their teams' losses to the Red Sox.) Bishop Bud Cederholm offered the lucky red socks he wore during the ALCS and a team cap. Winning bidder generously returned the cap to be auctioned again! A Patriots helmet signed by Tom Brady and a bat signed by Boston power hitters brought top dollar. In all, we raised more than \$22K for Jane Bearden's ministry in Biloxi and New Orleans.

For me, worship and fellowship are the best parts of Convention. We saw many old friends: Anoma Abeyaratne, Louise Conant, Ben King, Andy Stoessel, Pam Werntz, and others. Joe Robinson orchestrated much of the convention and was thanked by the bishops for his service. Pat Zifcak and Jeff Mello were singled out for their work and gifts.

Just before dawn on Saturday morning we were all awakened by fire alarms. We all executed an orderly evacuation of the Royal Plaza Hotel in about 7 minutes. As Joe says, you really get to know your bishops and their diocese when y'all meet just out of bed.

I will retire this year as Diocesan Delegate and, because of a rules change, Christ Church will be entitled to only two delegates from now on. But any church member may request credentials as a non-voting representative. I encourage all to try to attend Convention. This is an important process to knit together the Diocese and to fashion the Body of Christ.

In the Name of Peace, Love, and Justice

Christ Church celebrates the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., four times each year: on two Sundays in January with guest preachers and teachers; a work day in a place of need on MLK Day; and again on April 4, his feast day in the church calendar.

Dr King spoke out against the Viet Nam war at a press conference here at Christ Church in our parish auditorium on April 23, 1967. (Take a look at the plaque honoring Dr. King which is on the wall to the right as you enter the auditorium!) In his memory, and to honor the legacy of the involvement of many of our parishioners in the Civil Rights Movement, we will again this year have guests as well as our own Chuck Willie joining us to preach and teach.

Sunday, January 20, Dr. Charles Willie, classmate of Dr. King's at Morehouse College, retired Professor of Harvard's Graduate School of Education, and long-time member of Christ Church, will preach at both Sunday services. Chuck has labored tirelessly in Boston and around the country for social justice, and we are grateful for the opportunity to hear from him. The Adult Formation Program at 9:00 a.m., welcomes Professor Hubie Jones, Dean (1977 to 1993) Emeritus of the Boston University School of Social Work. He was BU's first African-American dean, and continues to be active in social justice here and throughout the country. He will talk about how Dr. King continues to inform this life of service.

Sunday, January 27, Bishop Barbara Harris, retired Bishop of the Diocese of Massachusetts, will preach at both services and address the Adult Formation class at 9:00 a.m. Bishop Harris was the first woman elected a Bishop in the Anglican Communion. Many of you may also know that Bishop Harris was the crucifer at the irregular ordination of the first eleven women ordained in the Episcopal Church in the early 1970's. Chuck Willie was the preacher at that service in Philadelphia. We are honored to have Bishop Harris with us to share about her life and ministry.

Monday, January 21, in observation of Dr. King's birthday, we will be serving lunch to our neighbors in Cambridge at the Salvation Army headquarters in Central Square. Please speak to Donna Kirven, Bo Fauth, Peter Lee, or Webb Brown to sign up to serve or for more information. All are welcome.

Reflections on the Capital Campaign

December 2007 marked the formal conclusion to the five-year capital campaign to raise funds for the first new Christ Church organ in sixty-five years, built by the Schoenstein Company of California. On this occasion, your co-chairs wish to express their deep gratitude to all parishioners and friends whose cooperative spirit brought this project to a successful end.

The instrument has a wonderful sound and has contributed to our make-over as one of the best singing congregations in the area. Recent visitors to the church have commented on the inspirational level of congregation singing they found at Christ Church Cambridge. The new organ and our Director of Music have attracted a large and glorious choir of volunteer singers – now the largest in the diocese! – who help us to “tune our hearts to sing God's praise.”

Parish participation occurred at all levels. From the beginning, we wanted the capital campaign to be a community building activity, and it was! We shall not forget the generosity of parishioners who held dinner parties in the early stages to raise awareness. Nor those parishioners who planned a series of three organ concerts to honor the installation of the new instrument. We remember well November 7, 2005, that clear, cool day when a hardy band of parishioners helped unload a block-long truck containing organ parts. And, of course, we shall never forget the 250 families and individuals who generously pledged their funds over a five-year span or less that helped to achieve and exceed the original goal of the campaign.

We must remember that the campaign to help this parish also embraced the needs of others. Of the money donated, \$125,000 was designated to the Barbara Harris Center, the Diocesan camp in New Hampshire for young people. The final payment of the pledge to the Diocese from this parish was presented recently. Please know also that there is a ten-year warranty on the instrument that does not expire until 2016. This warranty will help to protect our sizable investment.

Though the campaign is winding down, some funds remain to be collected. A report to the Vestry with more specific information will be made at the time of the parish's Annual Meeting. Meanwhile, may we, the co-chairs, express our heartfelt thanks to the parish and our loyal friends for your support. It was our pleasure to serve you. Thanks for giving us this honor.

Wardens' Corner

What a wonderful Christmas season, from the quieter days of Advent to our cherished festive events surrounding Christmas. Normally your Wardens report in the Wardens' Corner about various events taking place with the Vestry and around the parish, but in this, the next to last Wardens' Corner for your current Wardens, it is time to focus on the upcoming Annual Meeting on February 3. At that time there will be both oral and written Wardens' Reports.

As is our custom on the morning of the Annual Meeting, there will be a single brief Eucharist service at 9:00 a.m., and then we will immediately proceed to the Parish House for the Annual Meeting. At the Annual Meeting, we will hear reports from the Rector, the Wardens, and the Treasurer. We will also be electing five officers (two Wardens, two Treasurers, and a Clerk) who form our Executive Committee, plus several Vestry members, and two Delegates to Diocesan Convention. The Nominations Committee is putting together the final ballot as we go to press, and it will be announced shortly. This year, as has sometimes been done in the past, the Nominations Committee has opted to have the five Executive Committee officers and the two Diocesan Delegates run as a slate, with the other Vestry positions being contested elections. As permitted by our Bylaws, nominations may also be made from the floor at the Annual Meeting.

A few of words on voting. When we have multiple persons running for multiple offices, the procedure is very straightforward. If, for example, there are six persons running for three Vestry positions, Parish members vote for three people in no particular order, and the top three vote getters are elected. Our Bylaws permit absentee ballots if the Vestry so chooses, and the Vestry has voted to allow them this year. It is emphasized that absentee ballots are to be used only because health issues or travel prevents a parishioner from attending the Annual Meeting. Absentee ballots will be available in the parish office once the ballot is finalized, and must be returned to the office no later than 3:00 p.m. on Friday, February 1. No absentee ballots will be accepted at the Annual Meeting. Finally, we remind you that in order to vote at Annual Meeting, parishioners need to make a financial pledge to Christ Church.

In order for you to become better acquainted with the candidates, there will be an opportunity to meet them on the Sundays of January 20 and 27, and candidate bios will also be available at that time. Do take the

opportunity to meet those who have agreed to run for office. We thank them for stepping forward. As your current Wardens complete our time in office, we are confident that the Parish will be in good hands under its new Vestry leadership.
