### Letter from the Rector

Once in a while, when I am surprised by a few minutes between tasks in the mid-afternoon, I confess I sneak into the church and sit right on the steps of the chancel. It's the space where I stand to commission folks for ministries in our church, the place where I make announcements week after week, but to sit there in that empty room, watching the light play as it filters through ancient glass...it is a great way to spend a few minutes of quiet time.

I look out on those pews, and I think about where so many of you sit. I think about if you have changed your favorite sitting place recently and why you might have done that. I think about how you look coming forward to receive communion. Some, taken up in the splendor of worship, others burdened with a load of personal decisions, others still approaching with an openness to what may be revealed of God in this moment called communion.

There in the late afternoon light, I think about the different musical offerings that parade through that room, music from LEVAS, great hymns of the Church, choral and instrumental offerings presented week by week that stir our hearts and minds, and the solo performances during summer services. I hear announcements and descriptions of programs that describe your passionate visions of the world that is and the world that could be. I hear traces of all the sermons that echo in that room, some I've heard myself and some I know only from your memories. In that subtle light, I wonder about those who have been buried from that space, those who have made their mark on this family and who continue to enrich us, living among us in story and tradition. I think about all those who were never a permanent part of life here, those who come for a season and disappear again into the world. I think about the children that seem more and more to fill us up each Sunday and who work so hard to be patient with us adults for a whole, long hour. I think about a

range of friends who gather here to celebrate the many things about which we agree and to keep our sense of self and humor about the things upon which we differ. I think about the sick among us who come for healing prayers and inclusion in a time of need.

All these pass by me while sitting in that quiet, darkened space, and I'm reminded by God's own spirit that one of the church's greatest ministries is just to BE. For all the things we do and all the things we do well, a large part of our calling is simply to BE. Not to be a community of easy answers, nor one of unnecessary questions, not a community that always says we are right, but one that knows that we are always loved. If all the church's life could be lived inside that vision of God's love and acceptance for us, just think how inviting we would be to others. If we consistently and lovingly honored different perspectives and opinions within these walls, just think how quickly we would become known as a people who welcome a lively exchange of ideas and perspectives under God's rule.

These days of change and challenge are not here forever, but they are here. I wonder if, looking back on these days, from better days ahead, we will recognize that, when the culture was in a place of fear and turmoil this was a place of solace, faith and comfort. Not cheap comfort from easy answers, but the lasting comfort of a community that lives together through challenge as well as through easier times. For all the fear around us, I have a great hope that the lasting imprint on the church will grow from how we've treated one another along this part of the road. In Paul's words, "Faith, hope and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love." Live in God's love and

## Music Program

### Evensong on Sunday, November 2 at 4:00 p.m.

You are invited to join us for our monthly 50-minute service of Evening Prayer, Rite I. On Sunday, November 2, we will celebrate All Saints' Day. In addition to hymns, prayers and readings for the Day, the choir will introduce the service with William Byrd's beautiful, polyphonic setting of text from the Beatitudes, *Beatimundocorde*. Kenneth Leighton's modern setting of the Responses will contrast with Charles Villiers Stanford's cathedral-style double-choir setting of the canticles in A major, followed by John Tavener's haunting *Song for Athene*. This last piece was made famous as the Recessional music at Princess Diana's funeral, and incorporates text from William Shakespeare and Scripture. All of this will be framed by 20<sup>th</sup> century organ music from France: Marcel Dupré's *Cortège et Litanie* and Jean Langlais' *Chant héroïque*. The Music Committee will host a reception in the Library immediately afterwards.

## Loaves & Fishes

In 2000 when leaders across the globe came together to write the eight Millennium Goals, the first agreed upon was this: ERADICATE EXTREME POVERTY AND HUNGER. The drafters knew the statistics. One billion people live on less than \$1 a day. One person dies from hunger every 3.5 seconds. It seemed so simple and so stark -- people without money go hungry, and very hungry people die. The nations' leaders also knew that, despite the enormity of the problems, people acting together can help turn the situation of extreme poverty around with the resources we have at our disposal today.

Governments and non-governmental organizations, groups and individuals here and abroad have accepted the challenge to do just that. In the Diocese of Massachusetts, study groups have led to new efforts toward fighting global hunger. The Alewife Deanery, the gathering of Episcopal churches in this region, sponsors an annual walk to raise funds to fight HIV-AIDS in Africa, with a portion of that money earmarked for hunger relief. A recent Christ Church study group focused on the Millennium Development Goals, emphasizing the number of ways that one person can address each goal.

At a recent vestry meeting, members voted to add another simple way to fight hunger by launching the Loaves & Fishes Project. Simply put, at each parish-sponsored event where food is served -- stewardship dinners, pot luck suppers, receptions, holiday meals -- you will see a container on the serving table, ready to receive your donations in any amount. Marked by a logo stating "Sharing, So Others Might Eat", the container will be a quiet reminder that as we feed ourselves, we can also help feed others. A few coins or more generous "folding stuff", it will all add up. The CCC custodians will then return the container to the financial office, and periodically the contents will be sent to Episcopal Relief and Development, marked "to help end hunger."

If your household includes small children, you might make it a family project to collect coins to bring to the next picnic or family event. Help yourself to one of the MDG magnets as a handy reminder for your home bulletin board or refrigerator. Look for more information about the MDGs and this newest effort to meet one of them. Parishioner Seth Lancaster ([seth.lancaster@gmail.com](mailto:seth.lancaster@gmail.com)) will be glad to hear of your interest and your offers of help. "Share - So Others Might Eat." We can do it.

## A Short History of the Anti-Racism Committee at Christ Church

While Christ Church enjoys a long legacy of commitment to social justice it is important to remember that we were not always as flexible or as open as we like to think of ourselves today. In the early 1900s, white parishioners at CCC were uncomfortable worshipping with African Americans on Sunday mornings, some of whom were employed as servants in neighborhood homes. This sense of discomfort led to the beginnings of St. Bartholomew's church in Inman Square in 1908. St. Bart's has long been a respected sister congregation in Cambridge and an incredible influence in the lives of hundreds of parishioners over the last century. St Bart's is currently celebrating their 100th anniversary.

While Gardner Day served as Rector here in the 1950's and early '60's, our nation's Civil Rights Movement held bold support among Christ Church folks. Many of us rode the Freedom Buses to the deep South - Alabama and Mississippi, etc to work for voter registration. One stalwart parishioner, Mrs. Frances Peabody - mother of Massachusetts Gov. Peabody, even though she was in her elder years, was jailed in

Mississippi while working on voter registration. The Rev. John Snow, an assistant at CCC during this time, was also very active in the Civil Rights Movement.

In the late 1960's when Rev. Murray Kenney was Rector, a "Committee of Blacks" was formed at Christ Church and the Vestry granted a sizable sum of money for use at the discretion of the Committee. It was only after much challenging discussion, that the Vestry granted the monies with "no strings attached" – investing trust in the Committee's choices of how to allocate these funds within the Black Community of greater Boston. This was an early attempt at reconciliation and quite an historic event in this Parish.

During the early days of the Vietnam War, on April 23, 1967, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. along with pediatrician Dr. Benjamin Spock who was a committed Civil Rights activist, spoke against the US involvement in the Vietnam War at a press conference held in the auditorium. A plaque on the wall honors Dr. King and his legacy and Christ Church's history of commitment to civil rights and particular anti-racism efforts.

In the 1990's, the General Convention of the Episcopal Church USA initiated a nationwide effort that encouraged each Diocese to create committees and task forces. These committees and task forces were to plan anti-racism trainings and workshops in response to the reality that racism was still present on personal, interpersonal and institutional levels of interaction. Canon Ed Rodman was the point person for this work in the Diocese of Massachusetts. Several members from Christ Church (Webb Brown & Donna Kirven) were trained by the Diocese to join others trained to lead anti-racism workshops in parishes throughout the Diocese.

Christ Church Rector Bob Tobin created an Anti-Racism Task Force at CCC in the mid 1990's with the stated purpose of participating in a workshop sponsored by the Diocese entitled "Dreamworks." This Task Force would continue work through various programs, raising levels of awareness about racism, classism, sexism, etc., both within our parish and in our personal and work place/institutional interactions.

At that time, we began an annual program in January (around the date of Dr. King's birthday) to celebrate the life and legacy of The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.; his commitment to overcoming oppression of blacks by whites; and to celebrate the history of commitment within our parish to social justice efforts, always holding the theological view of looking to see the Face of God in every person and welcoming diversity in our lives and parish.

There have been a wide variety of activities and efforts sponsored by the Anti-Racism/Diversity Committee during the past twelve or so years. Here are some of those efforts:

- The annual January celebration of Dr. King's birthday, with special programs, music and prayers; special preachers and Christian Education speakers, panel discussions focusing on what parishioners are doing in their work place which lives out social justice, etc
- Anti-Racism Trainings open to all parishioners
- implementing the details for the visit by Rev. Jesse Jackson in the late 1990's to our Sunday service with a parish luncheon following
- initiating efforts with clergy and worship planning groups to include hymns from LEVAS each Sunday rather than on a "random" basis
- movie and book discussions on Race and other "isms"
- establishing in the CCC Library for use by all parishioners several shelves of materials - books, videos, tapes and pamphlets - focusing on race, class, gender and other oppressions within our culture
- service day in the community on the actual Dr. King Holiday in January
- special music programs during and after church services given by groups/soloists from the African American tradition.

In January of 2009 there will be a two-Sunday focus on the legacy of Dr. King, January 18 and 25. We hope that this short history helps to place that celebration in that larger context of our call and witness at Christ Church.
