Letter from the Rector

This is the season of joy and light. The weeks we spent in Advent culminated in wonderful celebrations on the Evening of the Incarnation and on Christmas Day. These were wonderful events in the life of our community. To see the church all decked out in its holiday best, to see our children take part in our central story, to sing the songs we've long awaited, to be in that room filled with the holy noise of community – those are all signs of a community at work. And then, we did it all again far into the night, this time a bit quieter but just as celebrative. The choir and bells shone like the stars and there was a sense of mystery in the air. Finally another gathering. This one of mostly familiar faces coming together on Christmas morning for yet another celebration. Each one was a bit different from the others and yet all held the central theme: that this is a most important festival and to celebrate it with those we pray with week by week is an important part of keeping it.

We had many visitors, some local and some from far away who were very complimentary about finding a dynamic faith community among whom to celebrate this special time. So while it may have looked like we were just doing “the Christmas thing” a big liturgy, much music, church at odd hours; we were also doing some of our primary mission. We were keeping the tradition of the Church, we were worshipping, we were offering hospitality, we were learning, (new things and things we have forgotten since last time,) and we were teaching our children. Along with that, between the services and before and after, we offered pastoral care to friends and strangers and aid to those in our community who are in need. So the message that stands out to me in all that is when we are at our best, doing our best, it's hard to draw a line between the many different aspects of who we are and what we do for those inside and outside these walls.

In these next weeks, we will continue with perhaps more deliberate work in many of these areas. Remember that we are **collecting warm things**, coats, hats, gloves, boots, scarves and blankets for our friends who use our facilities during the week and who frequent the Thursday night feeding program in our auditorium. As you are making room for new things that came at Christmas, pass your old things on through here to those in need. We have a good start on this offering, but I know it will grow and multiply in the weeks to come. When we gather for our first meal together in the New Year, the Twelfth Night Party on January 5, at 6:00 p.m. you'll find something new on the table with the food. It is a container marked "**Loaves and Fishes.**" This container is here to collect a little money every time we eat together so that we will remember those less fortunate than ourselves. It was mentioned in the Newsletter a while ago, but it is another way, every time we eat here, that we can bring life to the words of the familiar Episcopal table blessing: "and make us ever mindful of and responsive to the needs and concerns of others." So drop in some change, or a little folding money and what is gathered will go directly into outreach to the needy around us. So in the act of eating together, we will be feeding others. The truth is, it's not always Christmas, but we are always a people of the Incarnation, understanding that God moves through our lives, gives through our hands, goes on our feet to places of need and anxiety. As we move into the year that comes, whatever we do together, let it all be done just as if we were kneeling beside Bethlehem's manger where we find the Christ and where we truly find ourselves. May God continue to work the miracles of this season in your hearts and minds.

Report on 223rd Annual Diocesan Convention

On Friday, November 7, Karen Mathiasen, Seth Lancaster, and Mimi Truslow traveled by car to Hyannis, MA, on a temperate and slightly foggy day. We arrived at the enormous convention center (Resort and Convention Center at Hyannis) and stashed the car some distance from the building. Many delegates had already arrived.

After registering we squeezed into the enormous conference room. Joe and Jeff were already there having arrived the day before to help set up. Joe was part of the committee that designed the liturgy for the convention. Bishop Tom was seated on the far side of the very large hall on a stage, his image projected by several large-screen TVs. Part of his thoughtful meditation included one on the intriguing question to whom did he pray, an on-going discussion he and his fellow brother postulants had had years before. Later in the afternoon Bishop Gail (herself several days before a knee operation) hosted a film about her trip to Jerusalem last summer to visit the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, which is under the leadership of Bishop Suheil Dawani and his wife, Shafeeqa, who were guests of the Convention.

During the discussion of nominations for positions in the Diocese our own The Rev. Karen Montagno was nominated for the position of Provisional Clerical Deputy to General Convention. On Saturday Karen won the position.

Friday evening featured a cocktail party and Middle Eastern Bazaar followed by a festive dinner and live auction at which our own Jeff Mello dressed in traditional Palestinian attire and did a splendid job in the role of auctioneer.

Wendy Squires and Jude Harmon joined us on Saturday morning. The group was led through and heard support or opposition to the seven Resolutions to be voted upon. As a group these resolutions seemed to be less contentious than in previous years. The discussion that followed was more elaboration than debate. The resolutions passed with only a few minor amendments. The resolutions included immigration, transgender civil rights, slavery and reconciliation, nonviolence, feast days of Saints Andronicus and Junia, and supporting the Diocese of Jerusalem. Overall, it was a formative experience with plenty of time for prayer, fellowship, and fun.

On December 21, we enjoyed the Greening of the Church, followed by a special coffee hour with picture cakes celebrating our recent Christmas Fair and our Service of Lessons & Carols. As we go to press, we await the joy of Christmas itself.

Amidst the joy, we remember that Christmas can be a difficult time for some people. Thank you to David and Suzanne Smith for leading again this year the comforting service called "When Christmas Hurts." We also took some time to remember those in the Cambridge community for whom Christmas can be a financially difficult time. A special thank you to Paul Daigneault for leading the Christ Church "Be an Angel Program"; Paul notes that as a community we provided gifts and Christmas stockings for 40 children served by the Cambridge Department of Children & Families. Thanks also to our Emmaus Group who stuffed all those Christmas stockings. Thank you, too, to all those who donated to the food pantry. In January, we will be doing a warm clothing and blanket drive.

We are wrapping up 2008 with some property matters. We have signed leases with the Garden Nursery and the Bigelow School for their child care operations, and we are about to sign an agreement with Norian/Siani Engineering, Inc. for the initial system design phase for a new heating system.

On to 2009. January brings its own special activities, including the Twelfth Night service and party and our Martin Luther King Day observances. One of our major events of the New Year is the Annual Meeting of the Parish, to be held on Sunday, February 1, as part of a single morning service that day at 9:00 a.m. Tim Cutler, Mark MacMillan, Mimi Truslow, and your Wardens are serving as our Nominations Committee for Annual Meeting elections. Do be thinking if you would like to run for Vestry, or to nominate someone else. Nominations forms are available at Sunday services and in the church office, and are due in the office no later than January 5. The Vestry has once again voted to allow absentee ballots for (and only for) parishioners who are unable to attend Annual Meeting for reasons of mobility limitations or out-of-town travel. Absentee ballots will be available in the church office beginning around the third week of January and are due, without exception, no later than 4:00 p.m. on Friday, January 30.

In preparation for Annual Meeting, we invite you to discern whether or not you might be interested in serving on Vestry. To this end, we will be offering at both coffee hours on January 4, an opportunity to talk with current Vestry members about what service on Vestry entails. You certainly do not need to wait until then; Vestry members are listed elsewhere in this *Leaflet*, and you should feel free to contact any of us with questions or comments. In further preparation for Annual Meeting, we will offer an opportunity to meet with our Treasurers and Financial Committee chair on Sunday, January 11, after the 10:15 service with an emphasis on the endowment and special funds and trends over the past five or ten years. On the Sundays of January 18 and 25, there will be an opportunity at both the 8:45 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. coffee hours to meet informally with candidates for office.

As part of responsible governance, on Saturday, January 31, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Christ Church will be offering Safe Church training led by Jeff Mello, who besides being our Assistant Rector is a certified Safe Church trainer. Safe Church training is mandatory for people who work with parish children and for certain others in special pastoral situations. Many parishioners have already received an email with sign up information. If not, please call the church office.

Vanderbilt School of Nursing Honors Francie Likis

In celebration of the 100th anniversary of its founding, the Vanderbilt University School of Nursing honored 100 alumni and faculty this fall as Top Leaders. Among those named was Francie Likis. She is the daughter of Katey Seibels Russell of Montgomery, Alabama, and parishioner Kenny Likis. Francie was recognized “for her contributions to women’s health care and to the midwifery and nurse practitioner professions as an editor, author, educator, and clinician.”

After completing her MSN at Vanderbilt in 1994, Francie began her career as a nurse practitioner in community health centers in Nashville, Tennessee. In 2000, she graduated from the midwifery program at the Frontier School of Midwifery & Family Nursing (FSMFN). She then worked as a midwife in Florida and North Carolina, and joined the faculty at the FSMFN. After receiving her doctorate from the University of North Carolina School of Public Health in 2006, Francie served as Coordinator of Graduate Education for the FSMFN.

While studying at UNC, Francie co-edited the textbook *Women’s Gynecologic Health*. It won the Best Book Award for 2006 from the American College of Nurse-Midwives and is now used in midwifery and nurse practitioner programs across the country.

In January, Francie was named Editor-in-Chief of the *Journal of Midwifery & Women’s Health*. She also works at Vanderbilt University Medical Center coordinating the establishment of the Doctoral Program in Epidemiology.

Dr. King Here And Forward

MARK YOUR CALENDARS - January 18 and 25 - for the annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. two Sunday series to celebrate the life and legacy of Dr. King who offered so much leadership for racial justice and race relations in our country. You may remember that he spoke out with Dr. Benjamin Spock against the Vietnam War on April 23, 1967, in our Christ Church Parish Hall, which the plaque on our auditorium wall commemorates.

Here is an overview of the exciting plans for Jan. 18 and 25:

Jan 18:

- 9:00 A.M. Education Hour discussion led by Joe Robinson on "Where were YOU when... Dr. King was leading the civil rights movement during the 1960's? What were your experiences...?"

- 10:15 A.M. Service offers witness to Dr. King's legacy

- 11:30 A.M. Parish Pot Lunch - a time to celebrate the life and ministry of justice work of The Rev John Snow, who lived his pastoral ministry in the footsteps of Dr. King during the Civil Rights Movement. John Snow was Assistant Rector at Christ Church during the 1960's when Gardner Day was Rector. John died at his home in Ash field, MA, this fall and was beloved by many in our Christ Church community - in recent years he was Professor of Theology at Episcopal Divinity School and often preached here at Christ Church where he

and Mary were parishioners. Parishioners who knew John Snow at Christ Church during those years of the Civil Rights Movement will lead a discussion of Remembrance during the luncheon: Ed and Faith Chase, Jake and Martha Jacoby and others.
